Minutes from the October Meeting

Smallmouth Tournament Results

The starting time for the final DRFA tournament of the year, a smallmouth tournament at the Byram Access ramp in New Jersey, was delayed until 7:30 am, a half hour later than the original starting time, due to darkness. In spite of the delayed starting time, the temperature was chilly and the river was fog covered. The fog did not lift until after 10 o'clock in the morning. The river was cluttered with leaves, which made fishing with lures or spinnerbaits difficult at best. Even when fishing with jigs or live bait, the leaves were bothersome. Boaters had to worry about cleaning the leaves off the water intakes of their motors to prevent overheating. Jet boaters were having the most difficult time with the leaves clogging the intakes of their jet drives. They constantly had to rake off the leaves to continue fishing.

These conditions, however, did not prevent nineteen of the thirty-five contestants from weighing in a fish. The largest fish to hit the scale was a 3.08 lb, 18.75 inch smallmouth weighed in by first place winner Scott McDonough.

Walleye Fishing

Fall is a great time to hit the river and you do not even need a boat.

Rivers are high and surging in the spring; shallow and clear in the summer. The walleye are there, but the fish are hard to find and catch.

Autumn, however, is river time. Water levels are usually just right in October and November, and that means the walleyes congregate in whatever deep and structured spots are left, schooled up in this spot as if they are fenced in. Baitfish supplies are reduced this time of year and yet the season tells the walleye that it is time to fatten up. Here are some tips on how to get them.

Find a good spot to wade

The best spots are shallow, hard-bottomed runs with swift drops to eddies, troughs and main-channel drop offs. In most rivers, you can stand in shallow runs (always wear your PFD) and make casts to the deep water. Typically, shallow runs set up where the current is swift.

Once you find a promising run, follow it downstream to where it drops off and pools, often at a deep-water bend. The inside bend obviously has weaker current and deeper water, perhaps in the form of an eddy. Here the pool becomes a daytime walleye hangout. On the outside bend, there is just a trough, but it has a change in depth and current speed, which walleye like. They will stay around the edges of the bend.

Swim lures across the flat

At dawn and dusk, the walleye crisscross the flat, feeding hard. Fancasting crankbaits across the flats will trigger a response from the eyes. Slim stickbaits work best, like a shipshape No 9 Original Floating Rapala or a Smithwick Rattlin' Rouge. Expect hard hits

and action into the evening hours, especially under the influence of a full moon.

Pitch a jig

During daylight hours, try pitching jigs into the deep water and work them up the dropoff to the flat. Fluorescent green and chartreuse colors are fine, as is anything that resembles a crayfish when combined with a conventional leadhead jig in one-eighth and one-quarter ounce weights. Tip the jig with a fresh fathead minnow or a shiner.

Juvenile Shad Seining

Due to budget cuts, we are no longer conducting the seining for juvenile American shad. We get federal money for programs but none of it can be used to hire people to help conduct it. Here at the freshwater lab we have no fisheries workers or technicians. It has been that way for quite some time. The fisheries biologist for the northeastern portion of NJ recently retired, and will not be replaced. As result, I now have responsibilities there, in addition to Atlantic coast drainages and the Delaware River. However, my co-worker Russ Allen, of our Marine Fisheries Bureau, seines for juvenile striped bass at stations just below Trenton down to the bay. He also counts the juvenile American shad. Over the years, his numbers correlated well with what I collected in the upper river.

Although I do not have the actual 2008 numbers yet, Russ has informed me that his crews are seining up very low numbers of juvenile American Shad. That fact mirrors my observations, and other anglers' observations, on the river this year. Once, in August, I was in

the midst of a school of cartwheeling shadlings just north of Stockton. In September, I saw some in the canal near Washington's Crossing. That was about it. They had a poor spawn, for some reason.

Fishing Reports

Brinkman's Bait and Tackle in Northeast Phila. (215-632-0674)

Tidal River

John was only out on the river one time a week ago still finding the largemouth right inside Dredge Harbor. He picked up 29 fish most on crankbaits but a few on plastic lizards. Rick was back in Dredge last Friday catching 11 bass on plastic worms, rattletraps and crankbaits. He said he has a few of the biggest fish of the season. One fish was 19 inches a little over three pounds. One customer was up fishing the shoreline of the power plant picking up several catfish, crap and smallmouth bass. He was fishing with worms, minnows and corn. In addition, several anglers have still been doing well on catfish at the Frankford Arsenal

with shrimp, chicken livers and nightcrawlers.

Non-tidal river

The upper river from the rain over the weekend and on Monday and Tuesday is high and off color. Now it is not muddy but one customer was up on Wednesday and said the only fish he caught were on grubs fishing close to the shoreline. He picked up four smallmouth bass and one walleye with chartreuse and white grubs. This was in the Washington's Crossing section of the river. Charlie went down at the mouth of the Tohickon and went right back home. He said it was too high for him to wade. He did have several trips up the creek but said the water is too cold and the only fish he is catching are small bass with live bait. The last customer was up fishing the Water Gap over the weekend and said the heavy rain on Saturday did not stop the walleyes from hitting. He was fishing right in front of the I80 Bridge and picked up 13 fish up to 19 inches. He said the fish were hitting x-rap Rapala's in 18 feet of water. The morning rains were not too bad but as afternoon came, he had to get off the river. He was back on Sunday but the water was really off color coming out of the creeks so he decided to head home.

Ron said the Schuylkill River below the Fairmount Dam has been decent for walleyes fishing early in the mornings with sassy shads, shad darts and twister tails. He has had a few mornings with 15 fish.

The Susquehanna River before the rains this week was really starting to pick up for some bigger fish. Jack was out fishing the mouth of the Junitia up under the 322 bridge catching over 30 fish last Thursday. He said the fish have been hitting shiners, pumpkinseed grubs and smoke tubes. He had 11 fish over 16 inches. Moreover, one other

customer was up fishing Clemson's Island with live minnows catching over 50 fish with many 16 to 18 inch smallies mixed in. He said up here they were slow biting minnows and would not touch anything else.

The trout fishing has been slowing each week. A few people are still hitting the Pennypack but say the fish are still line shy and that catching a limit now is hard. Jim picked up five fish last Thursday with wax worms at Father Judge.

A few other people have been up fishing the falls at the Blvd. catching 1 to 3 fish each trip. They have been using mealworms, wax worms, corn and power baits.

Levittown Lake has been good for the few people that are still going up. One customer picked up three trout, two bass and a bunch of bluegills with wax worms under a bobber. He saw several other people catching trout this day. Core Creek on the other hand has been slow trout fishing. However, if you are looking for bluegills, perch, catfish, crap and even a walleye this has not been a bad place. Fishing off the dam or in the back cove with twister tails, the crappies and perch have been hitting in good numbers but most of these fish have been on the smaller side. One customer was fishing for bass with spinner baits catching two catfish one a little over 15 pounds. He told me several people have been fishing carp with corn and carp baits doing very good on 5 to 9 pound fish.

Trenton/Yardley/Morrisville Area

Dan Leach at **H & L Bait and Tackle** in Morrisville, Pa. (215-295-1400) reports that very few people are fishing the river in the Trenton area due to the weather and the poor water conditions. He did say however, that the river was starting to clear up but it was

running higher than normal for this time of year.

Washington Crossing/New Hope

Tom at **Tom's Tackle Shop** in Wrightstown, Pa (215-598-9891) reports that early morning is good for walleye using jibs or live bait. Walleye are also being caught on Nitroworms.

Live bait and jigs are also catching smallmouth in the River.

Neshaminy Creek is giving up smallies and rock bass on shiners, crawfish and small senkos.

Robbins Pond is giving up crappies on shiners and largemouth bass on plastics.

Easton/Phillipsburg Area

Bill Pierce at **Bill's Bait and Tackle** in Phillipsburg, NJ (908-859-5729) reports that very few anglers have been fishing the river in his area due to bad weather. The river has been off-color and running high since the rains. His shop only had one weigh in last week, a 5.75-pound smallmouth taken from Merrill Creek Reservoir.

The water levels in the river are higher than normal for this time of year and the water was off-color due to the recent rains.

Water temperatures in the tidal section are in the low 50's on both the incoming and outgoing tides. Temperatures in the non-tidal river are in the upper 40's.

All launch ramps are serviceable as of this report.

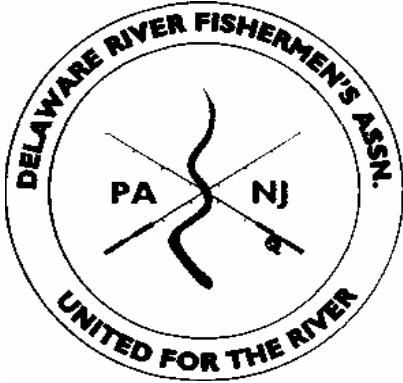
