DRFA Prepares For 2020 Season

Membership Renewal

Spring is just around the corner and it is time to renew membership dues for the 2020 season. Membership dues are payable by January 31. You may use the form on page 7 of this newsletter or pay your dues at the January Meeting.

Those of you who fail to submit your dues by that time will not receive your newsletter, and your access to the website and to the member forum will be discontinued.

Individual memberships remain at \$25 and Family memberships are still only \$30.

President's Message

With no one stepping up to accept the nomination this year, we do not have an official president to fill the role. In the mean time, members of the Board of Directors will fill in to lead the meetings and keep things moving.

That being said, it is not the same as having one individual to act as a central clearing house for

information and contacts, so if anyone is interested in helping the club by overseeing those activities, it would be a big improvement. As has been noted, anyone who steps forward would have the benefit of help from experienced previous presidents and the Board.

January Meeting Will Be A Working Meeting

The January meeting will be a working meeting on several counts. After we cover routine business for near-future activities such as the Hemlock Outdoor Event and tournament volunteers –under the direction of former president Scott McDonough – the members in attendance will work on getting the fishing rod and reel combos used for Youth Fishing activities into shape for the coming season. Members might consider bringing line trimmers/scissors, reel lube, and other supplies to be prepared for the work at hand. Pizza and sodas will be provided.

Another activity suggested by a member after our November meeting is to have open discussion on different fishing topics as a part of our meetings where another major activity – such as a guest speaker – is not occupying a major portion of the meeting. Possible topics for January might include ice fishing, early season preparations, or reports on recent outdoor shows

that members might have attended. The February or March meetings might be good times to discuss shad fishing just before that bite kicks into high gear. Members are encouraged to propose additional topics for subsequent meetings.

Minutes From November Meeting

The November 27 meeting of the Delaware River Fishermen's Association was called to order by President John Pedrick at 7:08 pm. The minutes from the October meeting were read and approved with the correction of one typo. (*Youth Tournament is scheduled for the Pennsylvania Yacht Club.*)

The tournament schedule for 2020 was discussed. A motion to go back to counting Angler of the Year points accumulated from all nine tournaments was defeated by a vote of 10 to 4. A tentative schedule, with some alternate dates to allow for flexibility around permit availability was developed. *(See schedule on Page 3 of this newsletter.)*

Treasurer's Report: Treasurer Eileen Kicinski reported a balance of \$9,751.53 as of November 27.

Membership: Membership Secretary Rick Mawson reported a total of 24 memberships for 2020 as of the date of the meeting.

Youth Activities: The club will target the weekend of July 11 as the date for the annual Youth Fishing Derby, depending on scheduling availability at the Pennsylvania Yacht Club. John Pedrick is going to check in with the Silver Lake Nature Center to confirm the date of their annual family fishing event that the club uses to accumulate service hours needed to defray the cost of rental for the meeting room.

Trustees: Nothing new to report.

Old Business: Members discussed the details of the club's Tackle Bag Raffle fundraiser. Discussion included past experience with the volumes of tickets sold at various venues, the amount of club funds contributed toward filling the tackle bag, and the net results from those efforts. The final resolution was that the club would have one bag of combined freshwater and saltwater tackle, and the club would contribute \$300 toward tackle purchases and \$100 toward a cash prize to be included with the bag. Members were also

encouraged to contribute new lures and tackle to help improve the attractiveness of the prize for potential ticket purchasers. Club member Scott McDonough generously offered to provide a free fishing trip for the club member who sold the most raffle tickets.

New Business: The club agreed to designate the January monthly meeting as a 'working meeting' to perform maintenance on the club's rods and reels for youth activities, instead of having a specific guest speaker. The work will take place after the routine business is handled at the beginning of the meeting. The club will supply pizza and soda to encourage attendance at that meeting.

In the absence of having an elected president for the 2020 season, the Board of Directors was to convene after the regular November meeting to discuss a way to maintain continuity in meeting leadership and club business needs until a permanent president could be elected.

Environmental Reports: The club will rejoin the Delaware Riverkeeper Network (delawareriverkeeper.org) in 2020. That organization monitors water quality and provides assistance with watershed planning and maintenance activities to protect the resource.

Fishing Reports: Frank Beck and Joe Newton reported on a guided trip to the Susquehanna River above Duncannon, PA on the week before the meeting. They caught 22 smallmouth up to 18.5" in 40-degree water, mostly on TRD Finesse Ned Rigs in the Yoga Pants and PBJ colors. Tullytown Cove produced 14 largemouth bass and perch, including an 18" lunker

largemouth, with most success coming from sun-washed shorelines. The Yoga Pants colored TRD Finesse Ned Rigs once again provided the best success. Scott McDonough reported catching one smallmouth bass as a by-catch during his first winter walleye trip of the winter in the non-tidal river, then having better success the following day at the head of the tidal river catching two largemouth bass and two crappie on the opposite side of the river from Trenton.

The winner of the 50/50 drawing was Joe Newton who took home a \$33 prize.

Minutes From December Meeting

The Annual Holiday Party meeting of the Delaware River Fishermen's Association took place on December 18 at Georgine's Restaurant in Bristol, PA, with several dozen members and guests in attendance.

John Pedrick presented awards to the top three finishers in the 2019 Dave Bryant Angler of the Year competition. *(The award is named after Dave Bryant, a DRFA founding member and past president.)* Third prize of \$75 went to Scott McDonough with 587 points. The \$100 second prize went to defending 2018 Angler of the Year title holder George Hoffman who also had 587 points, but took second place based on a higher total weight for his six qualifying fish. The \$150 top prize went to Mike Nucero for his 593 points in six tournaments.

John also called for volunteers and tackle raffle bag donations before the January 18 Delaware Valley Surf Anglers Fishing Flea Market. He reminded members

that the club’s regular January meeting date would include tackle repair for the youth activity rods and reels. The planned guest speaker for the February meeting will be Fisheries Officer Mike Blair speaking on PA fishing regulations for 2020.

The winner of the 50-50 drawing was Steve Raulfs who took home nearly \$100.

On December 27, Treasurer Eileen Kicinski reported a year-end balance of \$9,979.10 in the treasury.

It Takes A Lot Of Practice To Become An AOTY

When Mike Nucero became the DRFA Angler of the Year for the first time in 2019, it was not a flash-in-the-pan, overnight success. It is something he had been building toward, even if unknowingly, for most of his life. This past year, all that practice paid off by allowing him to clinch one of the tightest AOTY competitions in years, with five anglers all within 20 points at the end of the tournament season.

Mike’s Dad introduced him to fishing at an early age, when Mike started fishing for catfish in the lower Delaware where the family had a boat docked. As he got older, he spent a lot of time walking the canal path around Washington Crossing, casting for bass or panfish with a trusty rooster-tail spinner. Today he spends most of his time chasing largemouth bass in the tidal river or in area lakes, traveling to the non-tidal river seasonally for walleye or smallmouth bass. He fishes year ‘round, weather permitting. *(True to form, on the mid-January day of our interview, he had caught a pickerel, two*

largemouth bass, and some crappies after getting out of work early.)

Prior to joining the DRFA about five years ago, the only fishing tournaments Mike had participated in were some isolated saltwater tournaments. After his introduction to the DRFA through former club president Scott McDonough, he has enjoyed the friendly competition

Today, Mike typically fishes in club tournaments with Rick Gasper or Rick Mawson.

When asked about his ‘secrets’ to success, just about everything Mike had to say revolved around his constant pursuit of fishing knowledge. If he’s not out on the

water, he’s watching YouTube videos looking for new techniques he can try on his next trip.

While Mike does not claim to chart out a detailed strategy for each tournament, he definitely runs through patterns ingrained from years of fishing practice. Because he constantly tries a variety of locations, lures, and seasonal or tidal strategies, he has a lot of experience with different patterns that he can apply as conditions warrant on the day of the tournament.

Part of his tournament preparation includes having up to eight rods rigged with different lures for different circumstances.

2020 DRFA Tournament Schedule

All DRFA Club tournaments are free and open to dues-paying DRFA members only. (There are no club fees; however, ramp, launch and/or parking fees may apply. There will be a voluntary \$10.00 pool with a 100% payout to pool participants for the three heaviest pool fish {60%, 30% and 10%} at tournament’s end.) Members accrue points for the Angler of the Year competition based on their top six finishes among the nine regular club events. New members may register on the morning of an event, before check-in time (except for the Shad Tournament). Weigh-in is at the time specified. Late entries will not count.

Always check the DRFA Web site or the Tournament Hotline (267-934-2148) the night before the event to learn about any possible rescheduling or relocation due to water or weather conditions.

When asked if he had a preference for certain types of lures – e.g., he uses Senkos for logs, crankbaits for riprap, etc. – he admitted that he probably ends up fishing plastics a bit more than other types of lures, but he is no one-trick pony.

He tries to cover as much water as possible to account for a variety of conditions – depths, wood vs. weed-type structures, wind, etc. – to see what is working on a particular day. He doesn't just chuck and wind at a particular target, but explores the water around it, keeping note of the depths where he finds the fish.

As for his club fishing experiences, Mike recognizes how fishing in the club has helped him become a better angler through paying attention to where other people fish and listening to the chatter after the tournaments. He noted that there is good competition among the top tier of anglers in the tournaments and he has benefitted from what he calls 'friendly, not cut-throat' competition. While the new six-tournament scorekeeping in the AOTY competition gives more people a chance to compete, it also forces anglers to stay on their toes as the smaller number of scoring events puts more emphasis on performing as well as possible in each one that will count for them.

When asked about specific tournament experiences this past year, Mike did not have any make or break moments, but did note that while he only caught two shad during that early season event, he only needed one to capture the top spot that day. Perhaps the most nerve-wracking tournament day was when he worked hard to get his bait into a tight window around some structure and hook the fish he

believed to be in there, only to experience the heartbreak of 'the one that got away' boat-side.

When asked what he planned to do for an encore in 2020 now that he had a big target on his back, Mike's answer was simply, "Run!" But with a good bank of knowledge and strategies from past experience to draw upon, and another year to practice, it's more likely that he'll 'run with the big dogs' once again.

Joe Newton reported lighter than average attendance at the Delaware Valley Surf Angler's Fisherman's Flea Market on January 18th, due to the snowy weather forecast. Attendance was heavy in the morning but dropped off around noon. Despite the lower than normal attendance the club took in \$65 in clothing sales, \$55 in memberships, and \$139 in raffle ticket sales. Joe thanked all volunteers who helped with this event, and especially Pete Marcolina for putting together a great tackle bag. The club's only remaining show activity will be the Hemlock Rod & Gun Club's event on March 13.

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FREE Fishing Days in PA. 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Have you or an angler you know caught and released a 20", 5-lb. largemouth bass from Pennsylvania waters? A 19", 4-lb. smallmouth bass? How about a 40", 28-lb. Muskellunge? If you do that in 2020, you could qualify for the Pennsylvania Fish & Boat Commission Angler Award Program. NJ Fisheries Updates

Each year, NJ's Bureau of Freshwater Fisheries holds forums to improve communication with the angling public and to solicit public input in shaping freshwater fisheries programs in the future. The forums are a perfect opportunity for all freshwater anglers to learn about existing programs and to share their views and recommendations.

The Fisheries Forum for South Jersey will be held on Saturday February 22, 2020 at the Batsto Village visitor's center. A North Jersey forum was held on January 18, and a Trout Meeting will be held at the Pequest Hatchery on February 29.

Forum topics cover all aspects of freshwater management, including both warmwater and coldwater fisheries. Each year updates on specific management activities are provided, as well as open discussions on future management recommendations. Over the years, various regulatory, management, and stocking changes have resulted

from suggestions from anglers attending the forums.

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Are you a Skillful Angler? There's only one way to find out. Visit the NJ Fish & Wildlife website <https://www.njfishandwildlife.com/skflang.htm> to check out the qualification requirements and to download an application form. Many of the categories went without an entry in 2019, so here's your chance to prove to your skill!

In addition to awards for each species, there are awards for Trout, Bass And Panfish Slams – e.g., a Bass Slam constitutes both a qualifying largemouth bass (6 lbs. for adults, 4 lbs. for juniors, and 21" for catch and release anglers) and a qualifying smallmouth bass (4 lbs. for adults, 3 lbs. for juniors, and 19" for catch-and-release anglers).

There are also special awards for:

- **Specialist Anglers** (catching five qualifying fish of the same species within one year).
- **Master Angler** (catching five qualifying fish of five different freshwater and/or saltwater species).
- **Elite Angler** (catching 10 or more qualifying freshwater and/or saltwater fish within one calendar year).

From A2Z:

Where Have You Gone Rocky Jr.?



It was probably about 55 years ago, but I can remember like it was yesterday. After graduating from worms, doughballs, and bits of hot dog, I hit my piggy bank and took the first step in my transformation from 'fisherman' to 'angler'. The first lure I ever bought was a Rocky Jr. – all of an inch-and-a-quarter long – white, with a little splash of pink/red across its face. Little did I realize that it was the first step down a slippery slope toward a potential fishing tackle addiction.

Fast-forward about a decade, to right after college graduation when I took the big step up from small panfish lures to a bonafide bass lure – the Rapala Countdown in silver and gold.

This was about the time that my brother, my fishing buddy Jim, and I discovered that there were BIG fish in the Central Jersey lakes and streams we explored in my Dad's canoe. I'm talking HUGE 15" largemouth bass – at least huge compared to my panfish experiences to that point – leviathans that could inhale most of the freshwater fish I had caught to that point in my life.

Those were heady times. Yes, we still hit some of the spillways below local ponds in the early Spring of that year using small jigs and spoons, but once the waters warmed and we started to get the canoe out to the backwaters, it was all Rapalas, all the time. Sinking, floating, solid-body or jointed, silver and gold. And in addition to 14" and 15" bass, there were pickerel that pushed 20 inches – sinister-looking monsters with nasty lure-puncturing teeth and a nasty attitude to match. The day I landed a 22" pickerel on a floating gold Rapala was the end of my panfishing days and I never used those puny lures again.

Fast-forward again to the late 90s and my initiation into the Delaware River Fishermen's Association. By this time I had added a few Daredevils, spinnerbaits, and crankbaits to my freshwater arsenal, but only at the rate of maybe a half-dozen lures a year. After fishing on-board John Strada's boat multiple times, I realized that I was totally unprepared for the Big Time on the Big D. Over the next few years, I added spinnerbaits and soft plastics by the dozens each month as I spent most of my time chasing largemouth bass on the tidal river.

And then it happened.

I developed my smallmouth fishing addiction when practicing for a DRFA tournament up at the Byram ramp and my tackle investments exploded in a profusion of sizes, shapes, and styles. Buzzbaits, Senkos, topwater lures, Berkley power leeches, and tubes by the gross, in multiple colors!

A few years later, it was the Case Minnow age of enlightenment, followed shortly by an insidious introduction to the Cabin Creek spider jig. Those two lures carried me through quite a few summers before swimbaits started to ease them out. As I began fishing more and more in the colder seasons, Pointer suspending jerkbaits and hair jigs started to work their way into my heart and my tackle box. But all those lures were just gateway drugs to the hardcore stuff I'm hooked on today – the Z-man TRD Finesse Ned Rig!

And where are all those latest/greatest lures of yesteryear now? Some of them, like the 4" Mizmo green watermelon tubes I traded in for 3" Wacky Worm pepper shrimp tubes, are bagged up in an old cooler chest at the bottom of my fishing tackle cabinet. Others, like many of the soft plastic worms, creature baits, lizards, and Senko-type baits are distributed among a series of Plano tackle trays and Rubbermaid totes that rarely get touched. And maybe, just maybe, that original Rocky Jr. still exists in some small compartment or some old cardboard box somewhere at the bottom of all my stacks of tackle.

So what happened to all of those old favorites over the years? How could I desert some of the lures that performed so well as I advanced through my levels of angling experience? I think about

them every now and again when I am sorting through my gear, switching between seasons, between boat vs. kayak fishing, and between largemouth vs. smallmouth trips. Every once in a while I tell myself that I need to revisit those old friends, and occasionally I do. Maybe this New Year, it's time to make a resolution to take at least one or two old-time favorites fishing each trip and actually use them again. Maybe. Maybe if I have enough time to fish without the pressure of short notice fishing trips or the pressure of a tournament. But then I think, who am I kidding? Only time will tell.

So what are your old memories? Your old lures? Your old tried-and-true friends that you rarely, if ever, use anymore? As we explore adding some "fishing talk" to the ends of our club meetings, think about digging out some of those old reliables and sharing your experiences of them among other DRFA members at our meetings. If nothing else, they might just bring back some heartwarming memories for you. Better yet, they could help a fellow DRFA member chart their own new memories based on your past success.
