Bryan Malkiewicz Takes AOTY Lead After Three Tournaments

The start to the 2026 DRFA tournament season has seen a mix of good tournament participation but poor cooperation from the fish, as many competitors in the first three tournaments come to the scales empty handed. For example, only 7 of 19 anglers weighed in a bass in the initial tournament and 8 out of 13 scored in the shad tournament, although the May catfish tournament did see an improvement with 14 weigh-ins out of 19 anglers.

One third of the way into this year's Angler of the Year competition, only two anglers have weighed a fish in each of the three tournaments to date. Bryan Malkiewicz and Anthony Seliga comprise the top-tier in the standings with Bryan holding a four-point lead at 281 points. Seven anglers comprise the second tier with two fish weighed in.

Gain New Insights On Striped Bass Fishing At The May Meeting

On Wednesday May 27, Delaware River fishing guide Tim Keebler will focus his down-to-earth presentation style on his striped bass fishing experiences in the non-tidal river.

As a long-time guide with Fin Seeker Guide Service, Tim has been successful at pursuing shad, walleyes, stripers, and smallmouth bass on the Middle Delaware. In a prior speaking engagement with the Club, Tim received a warm reception for how he shares his strategies, tactics, and insider tips on maximizing fishing results for these popular river species. DRFA members, their friends, and the general public are invited to attend the presentation on Wednesday May 27 and ask Tim questions at the end of the seminar.

DRFA Youth Fishing Derby tentatively scheduled for Pennsylvania Yacht Club, if we have enough participants.

Supervised young participants sponsored by a current DRFA member can fish from a boat or from the Pennsylvania Yacht Club dock, and all must wear an appropriate personal flotation device (PFD).

In past years, the event has featured food, T-shirts, and fishing awards for the young anglers. Final arrangements for this year might vary slightly depending on the number of attendees who show interest.

Minutes Of The March Meeting

The March 25 28 meeting was called to order by Membership Secretary Rick Mawson. The regular business meeting was deferred until after the shad fishing presentation by Rusty Held.

Treasurer's Report: John Pedrick reported a balance of \$9,142.14 as of the meeting date.

Membership: Rick Mawson reported a total of 19 individual memberships, 4 family memberships and 3 supporting business members as of the start of the meeting. That did not include membership applications submitted at the meeting.

Tournaments: Scott McDonough announced that the March 28 Bass Tournament would start at 7:30 am due to extreme low-tide conditions at the ramp earlier that morning. He also reminded everyone that there would be no membership sign-up on the morning of the April 18 Shad Tournament. Only individuals who are registered before that date will be eligible to compete in that tournament. Members were also reminded that they must show up at the weigh-in location to earn the 50 points for tournament participation.

Youth Activities: There was nothing new to report on the Cluib's annual Youth Fishing Derby. Also, we have received no word on a date for a Silver Lake Nature Center Family Fishing Day.

Old Business: Rick Mawson, Joe Scannapieco, Jr., Frank Beck and Scott McDonough worked the Kingwood Fishing Flea Market on March 24, where there were 600 to 700 attendees. Rick reported clearing about \$90 on raffle ticket sales after the cost of the table.

Pete Antoniewicz recapped the results of the 2026 Fundraising Raffle, which yielded a net profit of \$382.39 after all expenses for the guided trip, ticket and poster costs, and show attendance costs.

Rick Maswon announced that fishing guide Tim Keebler will be at the May meeting. He will speak about striped bass fishing on the non-tidal Delaware River. If anyone has any ideas for future speakers or speaker topics, please contact a board member.

Rick also reminded members that the regular Saturday date for volunteers at Silver Lake Nature Center may or may not be scheduled for Saturday April 4 because of the Easter Holiday weekend. As always, members who do volunteer are reminded to designate the DRFA to receive credit for their work hours.

New Business: There were no new business topics to discuss.

Environmental: There were no specific environmental reports.

Fishing Report: Rick Mawson reported fishing for shad from the shoreline at Fireman's Eddy on the day of the meeting, where the water was well up over the normal ramp level. Rick has also been fishing the Falls Township

lake with minimal success in low-40-degree waters – just one, two, or three bass per trip. Pete Antoniewicz and Bryan Malkiewicz fished the tidal river the day before the meeting with water temps ranging from 46 to 49 degrees over the course of the day. The fish were slow, like a winter bite, to start. They ended with four keeper-size bass, two perch (one up to 15"), and one pickerel for a total of seven fish.

Scott and Casey McDonough had been fishing the river the three weekends before the meeting. The first week they went to Tullytown, where the cove was still mostly frozen. The next weekend they fished the lake on Biles Island, across from the Trenton ramp and had one bass there. On the most recent weekend before the meeting, they picked up five bass and a 22" striper caught on a jerk bait while fishing the main river.

The 50/50 drawing for \$50 was won by George Hoffman.

After the 50/50 drawing, guest speaker Rusty Held drew the winning tickets for the Guided Fishing Trip Raffle. The grand prize winner was Lori Cohen, who purchased her winning ticket at the Delaware Valley Surf Angler Fishing Flea Market in January. Five additional winners earned 10% discounts for guided trips with Anthony Awgul, and five more winners earned 20% discounts on Menace Baits lures.

Minutes Of The April Meeting

Secretary Pete Antoniewicz called the April 29 monthly meeting to order at 7:02 pm with 14 members in attendance. The minutes from the March meeting were read and approved.

Treasury Report: John Pedrick reported a balance of \$10,266.26 in the checking account as of the meeting date.

Membership: Membership Secretary Rick Mawson reported that we had a total of 41 members as of the April meeting – 26 individual members, 8 family members, and 8 supporting business members.

Tournament Report: Scott McDonough recapped the results of the March Bass Tournament where 7 of 19 anglers weighed in a legal fish, and of the April Shad Tournament where 8 of the 13 participants brought a fish to the scales. He also reminded members of the upcoming tournaments and the weighmasters for those events.

Youth Activities: Scott McDonough surveyed meeting attendees to see how many might be planning to bring a friend or family member to the DRFA Youth Fishing Derby tentatively scheduled for Sunday July 19. Because we normally pay a \$100 donation to the Pennsylvania Yacht Club to have the event there, it would not be practical to hold the event for only two or three participants. No final determination was made to hold or not hold the event this year.

We have not yet heard about a date for the Silver Lake Nature Center Family Fishing Day. Rick Mawson is supposed to check

with Patty Ann to see if an event is being planned for this year.

Old Business: John Pedrick confirmed that everyone was in favor of continuing our annual donation of \$100 to the Silver Lake Nature Center and our annual \$50 donation to the Delaware Riverkeeper.

Rick Mawson notified everyone that Tim Keebler is scheduled as the guest speaker for the May meeting. He will talk about his experiences fishing for striped bass in the non-tidal Delaware River from Yardley north to Reigelsville.

New Business: Pete Antoniewicz reported on his attendance at a New Jersey Fish and Wildlife

webinar on invasive species. (See separate article on page 4.)

John Pedrick said that he would work with the Texas Roadhouse in Bensalem about potential dates for a fundraiser this summer.

Several members indicated interest in a group outing on a fluke fishing charter if Bob Slobodian is still running his annual trip this summer. Pete Antoniewicz will check with Bob to see if he is planning to organize the trip again this year.

Environmental Reports: Rick Mawson reported on studies for prospective river access along the waterfront in Morrisville, PA. Nothing is definite at this point, but some of the more affordable

2026 Tournament Schedule

All DRFA Club tournaments are free and open to dues-paying DRFA members, with Club-funded payouts of \$50, \$30, and \$20 awarded to the top three places. Participants also accrue points toward the Angler of the Year competition based on their top six finishes among the nine regular Club events. (There are no tournament entry fees, however, launch ramp and/or parking fees may apply.)

Except for the Shad Tournament, there is also a voluntary \$10.00 lunger pool with a 100% payout to pool participants at tournament's end for the three heaviest pool fish – 60%, 30%, and 10%.

Except for the Shad Tournament, new members may register on the morning of an event before check-in time. All participants should check in at least 10 minutes before scheduled starting time. Weigh-in is at the time specified. Late entries will not count.

Always check the DRFA website or the Tournament Hotline (267-934-2148) the night before the event to learn about potential rescheduling or relocation due to weather or water conditions.

options could include access for small watercraft such as kayaks, canoes, and small aluminum boats. (See separate article on page 5.)

Fishing Reports: Frank Beck and Joe Newton were out at Byram the week before the shad tournament and Joe caught three smallmouth in a row on his shad flutter spoons. Frank also caught one smallie on a flutter spoon the day before the meeting, when he and Joe put another eight shad in the boat. Frank also reported that Bob Slobodian had 24 shad at the Yardley railroad bridge that day.

Rick Mawson has had fair success fishing for stripers on the lower river. On the Tuesday before the meeting, he caught four stripers from 18” to 25” plus two catfish. On the upper river, he and Joe Newton had seven shad while fishing at Byram from 7 am until noon on the day of the meeting.

Tim Lang had a good day with stripers ranging from 35” to 40” while fishing with his son on the tidal river near Trenton.

John Pedrick and Pete Marcolina had the most “beautiful day and boat ride” on the Monday before the meeting with just one keeper striper and three catfish for their efforts.

Joe Newton and Frank Beck fished the tidal river on the Friday before the meeting, catching six stripers – including fish of 33” 24” and 22” – plus another six catfish.

Bryan Malkiewicz reported catching 25 smallmouth up to 18” with Pete Antoniewicz while fishing the North Branch of the Susquehanna River on the Thursday before the meeting. The following day they landed 35 smallies – including an 18” and a 19” fish and many 15” and 16”

fish – and finished the day with a blitz of 18 smallies in the final 40 minutes (*with 16 of those in a 29-minute window*).

Bryan also reported a great day for stripers at the Highlands Bridge on the Shrewsbury River on the Wednesday prior to the meeting. Three anglers had 40 stripers while fishing the tidal shift between 7:30 and 11:30 am. They were using 9” Tsunami Shad swimbaits.

The winner of \$35 in the 50/50 drawing was Rick Mawson. The meeting was adjourned at 7:47 pm.

NJ Fish And Wildlife Webinar Outlines Extent, Potential Impact, And Concerted Efforts To Contain Aquatic Invasive Species

On April 22, the New Jersey Division Fish and Wildlife sponsored an online public presentation addressing the status of current challenges created by aquatic invasive species, along with the Department’s current efforts to contain or mitigate the impacts of those challenges.

Four aquatic invasive species (AIS) cited as particular concerns in the Delaware River watershed include snakeheads, flathead catfish, blue catfish, and freshwater drum. Also, the Division of Fish and Wildlife is working diligently to prevent snakeheads from infiltrating the delicate Pinelands ecosystem

The webinar acknowledges the challenges of invasive species management, including:

- Increasing popularity of snakeheads, blue catfish, and flathead catfish as sport fish.

- Public resistance to removal efforts due to recreational value.
- High reproductive rates and rapid spread in river systems.
- Predation pressure on native species and disruption of ecological balance
- Difficulty coordinating multi-state management strategies.
- Balancing sport fishing interest with ecological protection.

While discussing the severity of the blue catfish invasion in the Chesapeake Bay watershed, one shocking statistic cited in the webinar video is that it is now estimated that blue catfish comprise a full 70% of the total fish biomass in the Potomac, James, and York Rivers

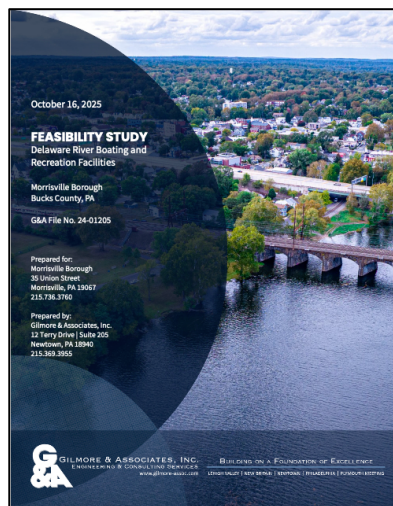

Is There New Delaware River Boating/Fishing Access On The Horizon For Morrisville, PA?

Rick Mawson recently contributed this information on a [Delaware River Boating and Recreation Facilities Feasibility Study](#) posted on the Morrisville, PA Borough website.



The study outlines multiple options for riverfront access -- ranging from launch facilities for personal watercraft such as kayaks, canoes, paddleboards, and lightweight aluminum fishing boats, to a fishing and observation pier, to a scenic walking trail, and an emergency-services access point. The range of estimated costs for various levels of access range from between \$50,000 and \$250,000 for low-cost cartop launches and ramps to more than \$5,000,000 for a full dock facility and dredging.

The conclusion of the study states: *“The hydrographic survey shows that while a traditional large vessel boat dock facility may not be readily feasible, Morrisville Borough has a unique opportunity to transform its riverfront into an accessible, eco-friendly public space. Features*

like personal watercraft launches, a central fishing and observation pier, and a scenic river trail can meet community demand for recreation and bring social, economic, and environmental benefits. These improvements would revitalize the shoreline, enhance river access, and position Morrisville as a destination for waterfront activity. By investing in infrastructure, the Borough can promote public access, wellness, and sustainability. This study provides insights into opportunities for the Borough and prospective private developers to utilize the riverfront as a community and regional asset.”

As the October 2025 study was just a preliminary step, don't expect a final resolution and construction in the immediate future. However, we will keep an eye on this potential upgrade in river access and report on it as more information becomes available.

Pete Antoniewicz finished a half pound ahead of runner-up Cassey McDonough with a 19”, 3.95-lb. smallmouth bass. Casey edged out his dad, Scott, for second place by just 0.04 pounds. Chick Bay, Frank Beck, George Hoffman, Rich Hoffman, Jason Johnson, Rick Mawson, Joe Newton, Joe Scannapieco Sr., Joe Scannapieco Jr, and Gregg Southrey earned 50 points each in the Angler of the Year standings

George Hoffman blew away the competition with a 13.68-lb. channel catfish, easily surpassing the combined weights of the second- (*Pete Marcolina*) and third-place (*Tom Ferrante*) finishers. In addition to those who weighed fish, Pete Antoniewicz, Dan and Dave Wermuth, Joe Scannapieco Jr., and Mike Wieszer earned 50 points each in the Angler of the Year competition.

Angler Of The Year Standings Reflect Close Competition

Overall participation in the Angler of the Year competition has been good. In all, 27 anglers out of our 41 paid memberships have competed in at least one tournament event. And 22 of those participants have weighed a fish in at least one event.

Given last year’s change in scoring that awards 50 points for tournament participation even if the angler does not weigh in a fish has had a big impact on the standings to date. Of course, that will begin to change as more anglers reach the six fish limit and start dropping their lowest scores.

Only two participants have weighed a fish in each of the three tournaments to date – Bryan Malkiewicz who sits atop the leader board with 281 points and Anthony Seligi who is only four points behind at 277.

Pete Antoniewicz, Frank Beck, Rick Mawson, Joe Newton and Scott McDonough have each weighed in two fish, but Gregg Southrey and Joe Scannapieco have edged ahead of Scott based on having earned 50 points each in two tournaments where they did not weigh a legal fish.

With six more events to go, the final top-three places are still up for grabs by anglers who score well in the remaining events. But the final top-ten standings will likely be affected by those anglers who simply chip away at participating in each event and weighing in a fish wherever they can.
